Call

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

It happened again. Each day brings little reminders that our culture is evolving/changing. And every once in a while, there are blatant/cold water in the face moments when the culture screams out that it does not know who we are as Christians (nonetheless Lutherans).

This is a repeat story, but one that must be shared. It is a local story about Ash Wednesday that a parishioner from my first parish would tell. He came to worship at noon to receive the imposition of ashes and promptly returned to work. He got onto an elevator and was greeted by someone who told him that he had dirt on his forehead. When he explained that the dirt was there on purpose because it was Ash Wednesday, the person paused in bewilderment. Then after the uncomfortable pause replied, "I didn't know that you were Jewish." Yikes.

In my own experience, I was out and about wearing the collar, a sign of the office of pastor, that I wear just about every day. In the beginning of ordained ministry many years ago, I was more mindful of the sideways glances I would get from people on the road or in stores. "Yes. I'm a pastor. And, yes—I'm a woman. No. I don't get called Father. And, I'm rarely referred to as Mother (in an ecclesiastical sense). I am a pastor, a priest, a minister, a servant of God, etc..." Nowadays, however, I don't notice the little reactions as readily.

Then I was taken aback by a conversation with a stranger. When I was asked about my Christmas plans, I referred to our Christmas Eve services and special functions around the church. I didn't think anything of it, really. Then later in the conversation the person came right out and asked me what I did. I figured that it was another one of those, "I can see you're a church person of some sort, but I don't know how to ask what kind of church person you are." But I was wrong. The stranger didn't even recognize the symbol of the collar. They had no idea that I worked for God and the church, let alone that I was a pastor.

People, in general, aren't advocates of folks standing on street corners with megaphones shouting John 3:16 at strangers. That isn't our particular style of evangelism, and it probably doesn't work very well anyway, but sooner than later we need to try something else. We can no longer assume that the community knows that we are here, and we certainly can't assume that our neighbors know who we are and what we are about.

We are a place of worship. We worship God who loves us and forgives us of our sins. We work together to bring this love to others. We work together to discern God's will. And, we do all of this at the corner at 3700 Rutherford Street.

Tell 20 people. Tell 10. Tell someone about God's people here in this place.

WALKING IN THE LIGHT, WE DARED TO SHINE

Blessed are the people who know the joyful sound! They walk, O Lord, in the light of your countenance. (Psalm 89:15)

Linda Post Bushkofsky, executive director of Women of the ELCA, in her Grace Notes *Gather* article, *Christmas, Beautiful and Messy* wrote, “Sometimes we seek change. Other times, change is thrust upon us. And then there is 2020....Now we accomplish so much...virtually.”

I have come as a light into the world, that whoever believes in Me should not abide in darkness. (John 12:46)

Yes, days have been filled with darkness and sadness but also with light and joy.

Women of Good Shepherd WELCA like the Matthew 5:14-16 scripture:

You are the light of the world. A city that is set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do they light a lamp and put it under a basket...let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven.

We found a way to walk in the light and shine. We didn't “hide it under a bushel.” We went virtual with our meetings and Bible studies.

For December, we also had to change. We found a way to collect offerings for our Prison Ministry Angel Tree. Our offerings help children who have a parent in prison receive gifts for Christmas. We also gave donations to several community organizations to support their projects that show “love for our neighbors.” We changed our Christmas Homemade Cookie



project to a Christmas Candy Project—another way to safely show our love for our homebound members of Good Shepherd.

For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Walk as children of Light. (Ephesians 5:8)

Members of Women's Workshop are “walking in the light.” They made masks for our church members, our neighborhood in a drive-by give away and have donated to many area local groups including CCU. Yes, they are making quilts.

In a December *Gather* article, *Love in Action* we learned that Lutheran World Relief is celebrating its 75th anniversary. Melanie W. Hibbons and Janel Johnson-Momanyi, the authors, start the article with, “ONE IN SIX. That's how many Lutherans were displaced by the end of World War 11. One in every five was a refugee, caught in limbo and uncertainty in countries not their own.” Lutherans in the U.S. created LWR to help. A decade later we were helping our neighbors in need throughout the world.

Yes, our quilts, school kits, fabric kits, personal care kits are still helping our neighbors. Women of the ELCA and the women's organizations on whose shoulders we now stand are the backbone and driving force for faithful service throughout these years of love in action. You have carried God's loving presence into refugee camps, droughts, conflict zones and systemic poverty. Almost 27 million mission quilts...plus so much more. We are just getting started....many thanks to Good Shepherd's Women's Workshop for being part of the past and the future of LWR.

A Message for the Christmas Season from Bishop Eaton

We are never alone

**Precisely in our distress, in our dislocation, the Lord shows up.
Emmanuel—God with us—makes his home
in the very places we find foreign or isolating.**

The room was spare and dimly lit. We sat on folding chairs in a circle—young Honduran women and some of us from the ELCA. We had come to Honduras to observe the work of AMMPARO (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities). This is the ELCA's strategy to help youth who have been forced to flee their home countries because of violence, abuse, extortion by gangs and extreme poverty. Amparo is the Spanish word for shelter or refuge.

In this case, AMMPARO partnered with the Lutheran World Federation and the Mennonites to resettle returned migrants—those who had tried to seek asylum in the United States but had failed or had been denied and deported back to Honduras.

One by one they told us their stories of fear and desperation. Not a one undertook the long and dangerous trek north on a whim. They told us about the abuse they had suffered, about family members who had been killed by gangs, about the inability to make a living because of the extortion by organized crime. They talked about the bitter sadness of leaving home and family, and the uncertainty of the future.

I remember one young woman in particular. She was pregnant when she tried to migrate to the United States. She had the baby somewhere along the way. She was far from home, mostly alone and desperately wanted her mother to be with her. None of this is what she had hoped for when she was growing up. Circumstances beyond her control had forced her into this new and strange existence. She and her baby were now back in Honduras—but not at home. Home was too dangerous.

Remember last Christmas? Remember all of the preparations, the travel to be with family? Remember the holy beauty of the Christmas Eve liturgy and receiving Christ's grace and forgiveness at his table? The shopping and Christmas caroling? The in-person gatherings? All that has changed. The pandemic hasn't forced us from our homes but into our homes, sheltering in place, isolated. Not together, but physically distanced. Not gathered with family and friends, but forced apart because of the threat of infection. Forced by circumstances beyond our control into this strange existence. Oh, there will be Christmas carols piped into grocery stores and other essential services, but they will be painful reminders of how life used to be.

We are reminded of the experience of the exiles in Babylon: "By the rivers of Babylon—there we sat down and there we wept when we remembered Zion. On the willows there we hung up our harps. For there our captives asked us for songs, and our tormentors asked for mirth, saying, 'Sing us one of the songs of Zion!' How could we sing the Lord's song in a foreign land" (Psalm 137)?

I told the young Honduran woman about another young woman who was forced to leave home because of a government decree. She, too, was pregnant and made a long and difficult journey. She, too, was far from home and without her mother when the baby came. She had to find shelter wherever she could. This wasn't what she had hoped for when she was growing up. Circumstances beyond her control had forced her into this new existence. That young woman was Mary and the child was Jesus. Precisely in our distress, in our dislocation, the Lord shows up. Emmanuel—God with us—makes his home in the very places we find foreign or isolating. The young Honduran woman, and all of us, can find hope because of the birth of Mary's child. There is no God-forsaken place and we are never alone—not in hospital rooms, or sheltering in place, or Zoom calls or on dangerous roads.

Many of us will not be physically home for Christmas, but we are truly home in Christ.

The next few months will continue to be challenging, but I know we will not only survive but thrive. We continue to serve families and build relationships. In Case of Inclement Weather

It has been and will continue to be the policy of Good Shepherd never to cancel our Sunday liturgies regardless of the weather. Some of our hardy members can reach the church on foot, and we take seriously our Lord's promise that whenever two or three are gathered together in His name, He will be there also. The only change in that policy would be if the governor of the commonwealth were to declare an emergency and order everyone off the streets.



Another possibility, of course, might be that enough snow would fall making it impossible to get to and into the exterior doors. In that event we will make every effort to have notification on local radio and television storm coverage. We have contacted abc27's Snow Watch, so watch for "Good Shepherd Lutheran Paxtang" in the announcements there. Wednesday services will be canceled if Central Dauphin School District cancels or postpones/delays the beginning of their classes. Remember to please listen to your local radio or television school cancellation reports before setting off to church on a Wednesday morning.

Purpose

Saved by God's Grace, led by the Holy Spirit, and nurtured by Word and Sacrament, the Good Shepherd congregation seeks to live and demonstrate Christ's love and acts through worship, prayer, fellowship and outreach.

Principles

The key principles that the congregation of Good Shepherd utilizes as its foundation in fulfilling its purpose are as follows:

We, the congregation, are:

1. Worshipping the Holy Trinity: God, the Father, as Creator, Jesus as Savior, and the Holy Spirit as Comforter;
2. Demonstrating and embodying God's love to all;
3. Spreading the word of God with the community and world around us;
4. Living in service to God and others; and
5. Sharing God's abundant gifts.
